

April Meeting Recap: Mark J. Palmer: "Whither Whales – History & Current Status of Whaling"

We were honored to have Mark as our April presenter. He opened our collective eyes about whaling as an industry and why it's so much more than hunting sperm whales like *Moby Dick*.



Whales have been hunted for centuries. Sometimes, the smarter mammal wins.

There have been three eras of whaling:

- Ancient whaling (dating back to 6000 BC in rock carvings discovered in South Korea
- 2) Commercial (Yankee) Whaling for oil (1650 1900)
- Modern Whaling for oil and meat (early 1900s to today)

More About Dr. Milton Love

For the past 25 years, and using a manned research submersible, Dr. Love has carried out surveys of the fish populations living around natural reefs and oil / gas platforms throughout the southern California Bight. Proving you can fool some of the people all of the time, in 2007, the American Fisheries Society awarded Dr. Love the Carl R. Sullivan Award for Conservation Resources.

"Better Than a Swift Kick Where The Sun Doesn't Shine – Interesting Fishes of The Pacific Coast" is the longer title of his May presentation. He says, "Most of us lead drab and colorless lives as drones and cogs in faceless organizations. With his tales of Pacific Coast fishes, Milton (only his wife calls him Dr. Love) will enter your world like a bright and fanciful rainbow, or a swatch of William Morris wallpaper, or perhaps one of those Baratza espresso makers that look like something out of a caffeine-induced fantasy."

More about Mark Palmer

For centuries, people have hunted a variety of whales:

- Right Whales Slow moving, large, lots of oil and blubber / meat
- Gray Whales Hunted by native American tribes along the Pacific Coast, especially along the Baja Coast
- Bowhead Whales In Russia and other countries
- Sperm Whales Up to 60-feet long, very intelligent (biggest brains), and some of the world's finest oil
- Blue Whales Can be 80 to 100+ feet long
- Fin Whales Are still being hunted in Iceland, but once hunted worldwide
- Humpback Whales Were decimated at one time, but have made a strong comeback in the Atlantic and with a healthy population in the Pacific
- Minke Whales Ignored during most of the modern era because of their smaller size, but hunted by Japan and Norway for meat

Despite global moratoriums and restrictions per the International Whaling Commission, Norway is still the biggest hunter globally. Japan is second and still very aggressive. Russia, Iceland, and Denmark are all still whale hunters. However, we're getting closer to the end of global whaling.

New Threats

- Pollution, including plastics
- Entanglement in plastic nets and lines — 300,000+ marine mammals caught
- Global warming
- Ocean noise




Renew Your Membership Now at Pre-COVID Rates.
